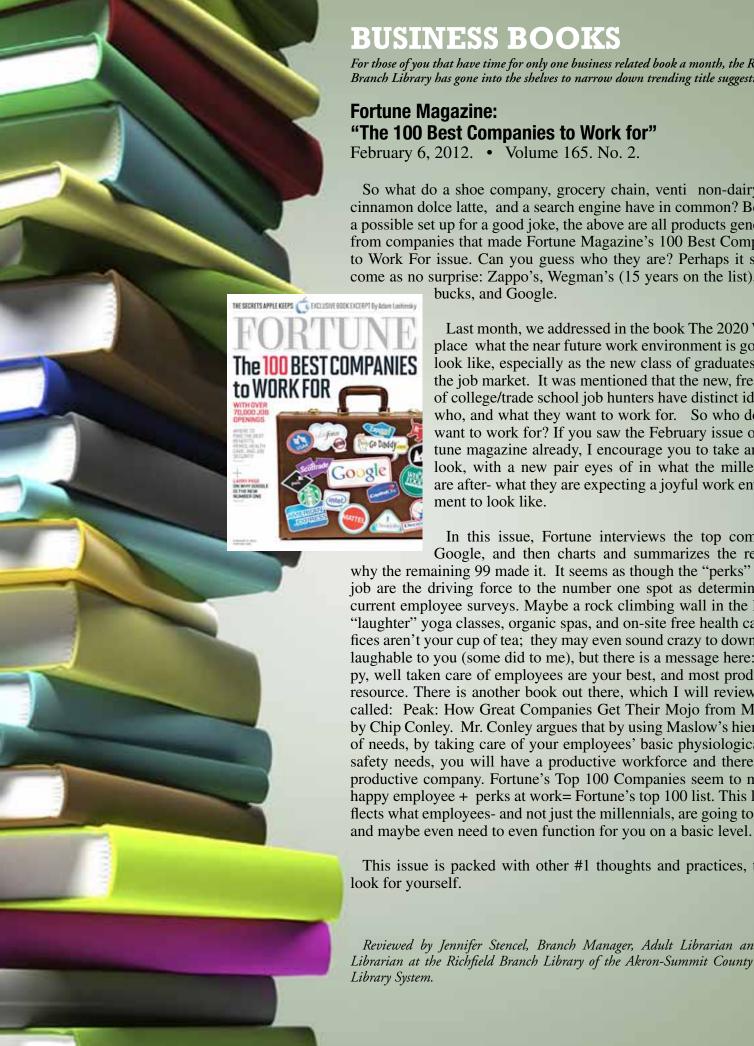

# **Fortune Magazine:** "The 100 Best Companies to Work for"

So what do a shoe company, grocery chain, venti non-dairy iced cinnamon dolce latte, and a search engine have in common? Besides a possible set up for a good joke, the above are all products generated from companies that made Fortune Magazine's 100 Best Companies to Work For issue. Can you guess who they are? Perhaps it should come as no surprise: Zappo's, Wegman's (15 years on the list), Star-

bucks, and Google.

Last month, we addressed in the book The 2020 Workplace what the near future work environment is going to look like, especially as the new class of graduates enter the job market. It was mentioned that the new, fresh out of college/trade school job hunters have distinct ideas of who, and what they want to work for. So who do they want to work for? If you saw the February issue of Fortune magazine already, I encourage you to take another look, with a new pair eyes of in what the millennials are after- what they are expecting a joyful work environment to look like.

In this issue, Fortune interviews the top company:

Google, and then charts and summarizes the reasons why the remaining 99 made it. It seems as though the "perks" of the job are the driving force to the number one spot as determined by current employee surveys. Maybe a rock climbing wall in the lobby, "laughter" yoga classes, organic spas, and on-site free health care offices aren't your cup of tea; they may even sound crazy to down-right laughable to you (some did to me), but there is a message here: happy, well taken care of employees are your best, and most productive resource. There is another book out there, which I will review soon called: Peak: How Great Companies Get Their Mojo from Maslow by Chip Conley. Mr. Conley argues that by using Maslow's hierarchy of needs, by taking care of your employees' basic physiological and safety needs, you will have a productive workforce and therefore a productive company. Fortune's Top 100 Companies seem to mirror: happy employee + perks at work= Fortune's top 100 list. This list reflects what employees- and not just the millennials, are going to want,
