The slogan "athletes aren't born, they're made" is partially dismissed, at least according to Gladwell and his book Outliers, but not how you may think. Spelled across his chest might read "Sorry, suc-

cessful people are born, but sometimes they're made." Gladwell argues that when and where you were born are factors detrimental towards your success, and have little to do with luck or mimicking winning behaviors. This is one of those books just primed and ready to be tossed into a conversational lull for those wanting a lively dinner party or to pass a long car trip. Why?

Experiment with this: see what happens when you ask what month your audience/guests were born, especially if they lean towards the athletic type. You'll get a reaction for sure. Gladwell claims that athletes should owe much of their success to the time of year they were born. Hockey stars, for example, with the zodiac signs of Capricorn, Aquarius and Pisces are sitting pretty due to some random player eligibility cut-off date. That's it. Your birth-date versus cut-off date made you or didn't.

If you are feeling particularly comfortable or feisty, ask what year your guests were born. Gladwell convincingly argues that place and time has a huge influence on career success and wealth. For example, take Bill Gates, Steve Jobs, and Paul Allen who were all born in the mid 1950's. What happened in the 70's? The technology boom, and these guys were sitting in the wings with their punch cards ready! They were just in the right place, dabbling in the right things, at the right time. If they were born a decade earlier or later, the iPod might never have happened.

Last, ask if your guest buy into the 10,000 hour rule (how many hours have you put into your golf game?- this might explain it), birth rates per year (how many proverbial fish in the sea), ethnic politeness, and what part of the country, or world for that matter, you are from. The arguments will be lively, and an aspirin might be called for.

So it just begs the question: can a business book actually start a book discussion? You just might find that your trip back from Hilton Head had flown by thanks to Outliers. And if you ask me what year and month I was born– I am on to you.
