Revere Schools Releases Quality Profile

This fall, more than 60 districts throughout the state, including the Revere Local School District, released a Quality Profile as a comprehensive companion to the State Report Card. The Quality Profile highlights programs and services that better define a high-quality education that are not

included in the state's report. For an in-depth look at the Quality Profile, visit revereschools.org.

Superintendent Randy Boroff said he is pleased with the district's high marks on the State Report Card, released recently by the Ohio Department of Education. The district received a 107.9

performance index (out of 120) and met all 24 performance indicators.

"While Revere is always striving to attain the highest marks possible, we are extremely happy with how our students performed on the tests, especially with the more stringent ratings system in place this time around," Boroff said.

Traffic Report

Brecksville Road over I-271 will be reduced to one lane of traffic, with traffic maintained by a signal through early December.

State Route 303 over I-271 is restricted to one lane in each direction for bridgework through early November. I-271 northbound and southbound will have occasional lane restrictions between Broadview Road and the Ohio Turnpike as well.

This work is part of a \$46.4 million project to reconstruct the pavement along I-271 from Broadview Road to the Ohio Turnpike. The entire project is scheduled to be complete by late July 2017.


