Your Network is Your Net Worth: Unlock the Hidden Power of Connections for Wealth, Success, and Happiness in the Digital Age by Porter Gale

I never gave it much thought, until now, just how valuable a professional network is. Networking is more than showing off an over-stuffed rolodex or having the popularity status of +500 "friends" on Facebook. What good is all that if you never take the time to con-

nect with those folks? Arguably, the importance of maintaining a strong network is just as valuable to you as to the amount of money and time you invest in customer service, employee retention, and the equipment needed in your line of work. Porter Gale, in her book: Your Network, explains how so.


ents and skills just as often. The author will guide you on how to generate such a "powerpocket" circle(s).
