
BUSINESS BOOKS

For those of you who have time for only one business related book a month, the Richfield Branch Library has gone into the shelves to narrow down trending title suggestions.

Valley of Genius: The Uncensored History of Silicon Valley (As Told by the Hackers, Founders, and Freaks Who Made It Boom)

By Adam Fisher Twelve, 2018 ISBN-10: 1455559024

Based on more than 200 personal interviews, Adam Fisher's new book Valley of Genius outlines the history of what would become the largest and richest business center in the United States. Fisher, who grew up in Silicon Valley and is a contribu-



tor to Wired Magazine, knows the landscape and many of the participants intimately. Told largely through anecdotes, the book covers the tech mecca from the early 1970's, when the Valley smelled like fruit cocktail because

of the mammoth Dole factory located there (according to Atari founder Nolan Bushnell), through the current trials of social media giants like Facebook in dealing with fraudulent posts meant to politically influence subscribers.

The book is by no means a how-to for entrepreneurs looking to start the next big technology firm, but rather a series of stories about the unlikely individuals who were key to developing the internet and subsequent industries that were fostered by its growth. From stories such as how Steve Jobs hired Ridley Scott to film "1984", arguably one of the most influential commercials of all time for the first Macintosh computers, to the fact that Google founders Sergey Brin and Larry Page, say the origin of the company was "kind of a mistake – an accidental by-product of graduate student whimsy and preposterous dreams", the book is a fun read for anyone interested in the origins of the tech revolution.
